Introduction.

- The border-to-prison pipeline is when prison profits from the labor and detention of undocumented immigrants. The detention center is a prison for immigrants and their families.
- It is estimated that around 380,000 to 442,000 immigrants are detention each year. Most of the prisons are owned by a private company that make a profit off the detention of immigrants.
- Government policies like the 1790 Naturalization Act affects the border-to- prison pipeline. This Law required that a person needs to be in the U.S. for a certain amount of year for residency.
- Executive orders: Trump's policies during his first 100 days office was to crack down on immigrants.
- SB 1070: Authorized policies to determine reasonable suspicion on immigrants if they are legal are not legal.

Methodology.

- In order to backup my claims for my research, I looked at various policies enforced by the government intended to exploit undocumented immigrants. Immigrants are being snatched out of homes, workplaces, public areas and then deported into private detention centers. The statistics that I gathered from Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) support my evidence that thousands of illegal immigrants and their families are kept in detention centers due to government policies. Around 15,000 undocumented immigrants are being taken each day based on my research. I also examined President Trump's policies on immigration to help me finalize my poster. The research process look significantly more time when than the process of finalizing the poster. On 7/27/17, we called Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to gather information on the average sentence undocumented immigrants are detained, but we were denied an answer.

Results.

- As a result of my research, I found out that it cost the taxpayer \$2 billion to keep detention center running, that approximately \$23, 000 per person. Immigrant are placed in a detention center as a work labor under government policies for which they get paid as little as \$3 dollar a day. Many of the detention centers are owned by private company prison that made a profit off labor. Many of job in is lost in the detention center which government and private corporate company funds. The idea of a detention center for the immigrant is too expensive, the family is being locked up in a cage and to many people are being captured on the daily based for the benefit of private business and government. The idea of Detention center is another term for prison for an immigrant family.


