## Eczema


• Reddish hues vs. brown, violet, or ash grey hues








### Textbook content


- Lack of diverse skin tones

#### Patient outcomes

#### • Treatment Biases

- Black and Latino children are less likely to receive fewer bacteria diagnosis than white children
- Women of color are less likely to be asked about their family history of breast cancer
- Skin cancer for individuals with a darker skin tone is deadlier from delay of diagnosis

- This study does not explore the impact of these images in other medical disciplines.


